Celebrate or Hold a Requiem

If you've won, congratulations! Hold a big public party and make it free if you can. Invite everyone, including those people that may not have been in your corner the whole time. Send out emails. Post how you did it on your website or mail it to the community in a newsletter. And profusely thank all those that were involved.

If you've lost this battle, keep the long-term goal in mind. Take some time to recover your energy before jumping into the next battle. Post your "lessons learned" on your website or publish them on a blog or newsletter. And thank all those that were involved. Send a message to all your supporters to thank them and let them know that their (and your) efforts were not in vain and that you've built momentum. Tell your supporters which project they could consider supporting next.

Prevent the Next Crisis

Check your community's preservation plans such as surveys, general plan, preservation ordinance, economic incentive programs, and others to determine which could be strengthened.

Plan a program of preservation education for the community and elected officials. Might be good to start with a tour of significant historic sites.

Attend your local Historic Preservation Commission's meetings and provide public input. Get to know them and what their goals are for the future.

Work with your allies and other advocacy groups to continue building momentum in your community to support preservation-related activities such as your <u>local</u> <u>historic preservation commission</u>, a local nonprofit group, and Main Street.

Keep in contact with your supporters until the next preservation issue arises.
